The Behavioral Health and Child Welfare Integrated Recovery Initiative is a coordinated system that includes the Broward Sheriff's Office (BSO) Child Protection Unit (CPI), ChildNet (local CBC), Broward's SAMH provider network, certified peer specialist services, BBHC, and DCF. A key component of this initiative is the Family Engagement Program (FEP). The primary goal of FEP is to ensure families identified by BSO CPIs with parents presenting SAMH problems that put children at risk of harm are linked to clinically appropriate services that produce positive outcomes and facilitate recovery. These efforts include needed healthcare, childcare, shelter placement, food, clothing, and any other resources to promote wellness for the family.





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#### Texas Christian University Mapping Enhanced Counseling Tools in Substance Abuse Treatment

This presentation will discuss cognitive tools for enhancing substance abuse treatment, specifically the Texas Chrsitian University (TCU) Mapping Enhanced Counseling tools. Mapping enhanced counseling is an evidencebased graphic representation strategy used to visually enhance the counseling process, both between counselors and client(s), or as part of the presentation and implementation of TCU intervention manuals. It is included in the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration's (SAMHSA) National Registry of Evidencebased Programs and Practices (NREPP). Mapping is an effective strategy for increasing client motivation, engagement, participation, and retention in treatment by promoting more positive interactions with other clients and treatment staff. It facilitates communication, memory, and problem-solving during counseling sessions and helps document progress both within and between sessions. This presentation will include a brief introduction and primer to mapping principles, evidence for mapping effectiveness, and an overview of TCU intervention manual.

#### Using Constructivist Therapies in a Medical Model World

Most of us are trained to diagnose and work within a medical model of searching out deficits and labeling them. This process is necessary in order for us to understand the client's situation and communicate with other professionals and those who reimburse our work. The premise is that we can all agree on the same reality. Yet, the emergence of constructivist approaches such as Solution Focused Therapy and Narrative Therapy depend upon our understanding that reality is different for each person. Each constructivist approach recommends consistent application of a strength based framework personalized for that client only which avoids or de-emphasizes medical model based pathology. This workshop will examine ways to work consistently in a strength based way with our client while keeping track of our diagnostic and problem focused trains of thought which our agencies and practices require.

He has been the medical director of several methadone clinics in Rhode Island and co-owns a substance abuse clinic dedicated to helping others get well and regain their lives. He is the proud husband of Maurine and the father of a daughter Katherine, twin daughters Nicole and Amanda, and son Chip (aka Sylvester Sviokla IV). He is also the gratified grandpa to eight wonderful grandchildren who love him dearly and have never seen him impaired.

#### Updates in Schizophrenia: Research, Remission, and Recovery

#### Death in the Suburbs: How Heroin Has Changed Science, Treatment, and Recovery

Dr. Marvin Seppala, MD, Chief Medical Officer, Hazelden Betty Ford Foundation and Adjunct Professor, Hazelden Graduate School of Addiction Studies, Center City, MN

A just-published JAMA Psychiatry study, "The Changing Face of Heroin Use in the United States", reveals that heroin users in treatment in the United States are predominately white (90%) and live in non-urban areas (75%) that are affluent. The theory is that heroin is more accessible and cheaper than prescription opioids and users deem the legal and safety risks worth it to continue to feed their addiction. Heroin users jumped from about 373,000 in 2007 to 669,000 in 2012, and the number of those with heroin "dependence or abuse" more than doubled from 2002 to 2012, going from about 214,000 to 467,000 in 10 years, forcing treatment centers to begin to adopt the use of medication for opioid dependence, tailor evidence-based therapies, and extend purposeful clinical interventions and engagement to support successful, self-driven recovery management.

The non-medical use of medicinal drugs and other chemicals is a direct or indirect cause of many encounters between patients and treatment/prevention specialists. Often the drugs being abused go by a variety of slang names which immediately identify the agent involved or its corresponding toxicity. It is important for the practitioner to stay abreast of the current drugs being used and the various conditions under which they are taken. The purpose of this presentation is to discuss current use patterns of drugs among the recreational drug users and their corresponding toxic properties.

More specifically, drugs that previously dominated the abuse scene have taken a back seat to newer, more dangerous drugs. Synthetic cannabinoids have proven to be a particularly dangerous group of compounds and synthetic cathinones (aka Bath Salts) are even more toxic. Professional Coaching is to the 21st century what counseling was to the 20th and is part of the new norm in addiction services. It empowers people to start their sober life on a solid footing and energizes people in long term recovery from addiction or codependency to experience new levels of satisfaction and purpose. The strengths-based focus of the coaching relationship itself is uniquely suited for enhancing resiliency and imparting non-clinical skills that are able to shift neural activity away from toxic cravings and related behaviors (lower-order brain functions) to the brain relationally-based executive control center. Rise Professional Recovery Coaching emphasizes self-regulation through essential quieting, mindfulness, and appreciation states which restore relational brain circuits, plus solution focused questioning, motivational enhancement, discerning thinking errors, planning, and envisioning change.

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




