
FBHA HISTORY

★ Standing on the foundation of two long-standing, instrumental organizations merging together – the Florida Council for Community Mental Health and the Florida Alcohol and Drug Abuse Association – the Florida Behavioral Health Association was formed in 2019.

The consolidation came at a time of increased understanding and recognition that mental illness and substance use disorder are often co-occuring.

In 2019, FBHA was new in name but not in its mission. For decades, the community providers that both organizations represented served Florida's most vulnerable populations and continue today.

During this past fiscal year, FBHA celebrated five years since the historic merger. In the last five years, FBHA has significantly increased public awareness, understanding, investment, and respect for mental health and substance use disorder treatment services.









VICTORY IN TALLAHASSEE

2025 Legislative Accomplishments

- Successfully influenced the Legislature to advance CCBHCs by including proviso in the General Appropriations Act directing state agencies to complete steps necessary for implementation.
 - Secured proviso language directing AHCA to seek federal approval to establish a prospective payment plan for CCBHC implementation no later than October 2025, and submit a legislative budget request for the 2026 legislative session.
 - Secured proviso language directing DCF to develop a certification process for CCBHCs by June 30, 2026, and to establish a CCBHC covered service within its financial rules that incorporates a prospective payment system in alignment with federal CCBHC payment guidance.
- Defeated legislation that would have diminished mental health and substance use services previously provided to children and adolescents.
- Guided SB 1620, the Mental Health and Substance Use Commission bill, and HB 633, the Behavioral Health Managing Entities bill, across the finish line with revisions that enhance community providers and the services they provide.
- In a fiscal year where the budget was cut by over \$1.5 billion, FBHA worked with legislative budget leaders to increase the overall recurring community substance use and mental health budget by over \$20 million.
 - Further increased the central receiving facilities (CRF) budget and brought new CRFs on board.
 - Received a Medicaid rate increase for Targeted Case Management.
 - Increased the Criminal Justice Reinvestment Grants budget to serve more Floridians involved in the justice system.

Additional CCBHC Accomplishments

- Engaged a consulting firm to assist CCBHC members in developing cost reports for AHCA to develop a cost model.
- Continued the statewide CCBHC Learning Collaborative to provide members an opportunity to gain knowledge about the model, receive updates on state and federal implementation progress, and share best practices.

PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Learning Management System (LMS)

- In partnership with the Department of Children and Families, FBHA administers the Department's Learning Management System, providing more than 50 training and continuing education courses for Florida's mental health and substance use professionals.
- · During the past year, FBHA
 - Administered courses for 22,246 people.
 - Updated Baker and Marchman Act courses to reflect legislative changes.
 - Updated the LMS home page to be more user friendly.
 - Implemented easy annual renewal options for course completion.

Webinar Successes

- With support from the Florida Department of Children and Families, FADAA administers webinars designed for professionals in the substance use and mental health sector, including behavioral health practitioners, prevention specialists, peer recovery professionals, healthcare providers, and community-based organizations. Webinars offer continuing education credits and are archived in a training library for ondemand access.
- During the past year, FADAA delivered a total of 22 webinars. The two most highly attended sessions were
 - "2024 Legislative Updates to the Baker and Marchman Acts" conducted by Community Assisted and Supported Living, Inc. and FBHA Legislative Advocacy Chair
 - "Empowering Conversations: Mastering Motivational Interviewing and De-escalation Techniques."

Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) Programs and Training

- MAT programs ensure that individuals have statewide access to a whole-patient approach for treating substance use disorders and preventing substancerelated overdoses. FADAA develops and maintains a network of 65 community-based providers to administer MAT and reimburses providers for the cost and administration of medications. FADAA also implements statewide training sessions to advance knowledge and awareness of MAT among health care providers and key community partners such as law enforcement and criminal justice stakeholders.
- Program successes
 - 1,696 new patients were screened for treatment services.
 - 1,567 received a medical assessment and laboratory service.

- 94% of patients assessed began medication
- 3,343 individuals received medication
 - 6,522 injections of extended-release injectable naltrexone.
 - 624 injections of long-acting buprenorphine (Sublocade®/Brixadi®).
 - 55.016 doses of methadone.
 - 86,894 doses of sublingual/buccal buprenorphine.
 - 1,314 doses of oral naltrexone.

Training Successes

- FADAA administers the MAT in Corrections Training program in county jails to equip correctional staff with knowledge and skills about opioid use disorder and medications used to treat it.
 - · Conducted 17 sessions to train 206 individuals.
 - Since inception in 2023, conducted 75 sessions to train more than 1,000 correction professionals across the state.
- Conducted April 2025 training on MAT Treatment and Resources for the Office of the State Court Administrator's Problem-Solving Courts.


FBHA Administrator's Forum






